



**Jeffrey Burke**, Executive Director

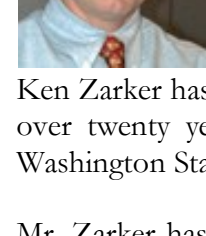

*Region 10*



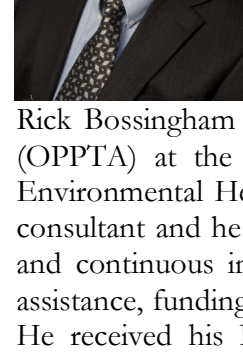

**Stephanie D'Agostino**

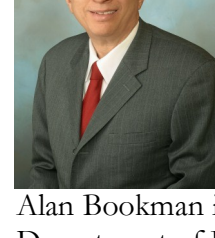

*Region 2*

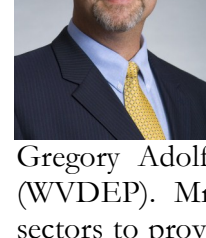

**Lissa McCracken**

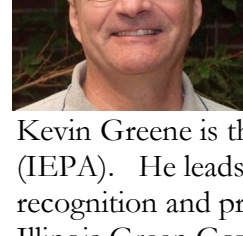

**Michael Simpson**

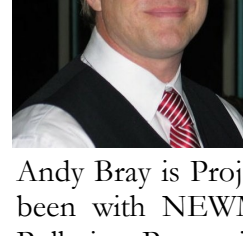
